





As a dominant leader of his party, he built the New Deal Coalition, which defined modern liberalism in the United States throughout the middle third of the 20th century. His third and fourth terms were dominated by World War II, which ended shortly after he died in office."

# Overview of Five Democratic Competencies

**Lift Every Voice** promotes and teaches five Democratic Competencies. These competencies include the values, skills, and knowledge we need to create a more democratic society and country. Each of the five books in Lift Every Voice presents one of these competencies.

**Book 1: Democratic Values** includes the democratic values that can guide the growth of democracy in our country. We argue that two of the most important values are love and freedom.

**Book 2: Social and Emotional Skills** includes the skills that can help bring more love and freedominto our society such as social perspective taking and social problem solvina.


**Book 3: Democratic Skills and Practices** includes the skills we need to participate in the civic life of our communities and our society such as learning to advocate, discuss, and debate ways to solve major social and ecological problems.

**Book 4: Social and Ecological Awareness** helps us to explore the social, economic, and political features of our country so that we can more effectively advocate ways to improve it.

And in **Book 5**: **Democratic Knowledge**, we explore in depth the major features of our democratic government: U.S. Constitution, Bill of Rights, Constitutional Principles, the Amendments, the Branches of Government, major court cases, and the responsibility of state and local governments.

With these Democratic Competencies, we will be able to use them to advocate ways to solve major social and ecological problems in our country, such as how to prevent gun violence, how to stop the pandemic, how to stop police violence, and how to stop global warming.






### Overview of Democratic Knowledge

The Democratic Knowledge component of Lift Every Voice consists of six subcomponents which seek to provide you with an overall understanding of the organization and principles which guide our democratic government.

- **1. The Founding Documents:** Support and Improve Our Constitution. We begin with reading and analyzing the Declaration of Independence, the U.S. Constitution, and the Bill of Rights and then review the democratic principles that guided the development of these documents.
- **2. The Legislative Branch:** Transform Our Voices and Our Proposals Into Laws. We then focus on the three branches of our federal government beginning with the legislative branch which consists of the U.S. Senate and the U.S. House of Representatives. The Congress which refers to both houses of the legislative branch is primarily responsible for passing the laws and the budgets for our government and country.
- **3. The Executive Branch:** Make Our Voices Heard by Our President. The President and the executive branch are responsible for enacting these laws and managing the disbursement of funds appropriated by the Congress.
- **4. The Judicial Branch:** Pursue Truth and Justice Through the Courts. At the national level the Supreme Court has the responsibility to resolve conflicts between the legislative and executive branches and to rule on broader legal issues which affect the whole country and to assure that the resolution of these issues is consistent with our constitution.



- **5. Major Amendments, Laws, and Court Decisions:** Improve Our Constitution, Laws, an Constitution. These founding documents become the foundation for the ongoing growth of our democratic government. This includes first of all the passage of Amendments to the Constitution such as those providing freedom to the slaves and the vote to women. Then there are the laws passed by Congress such as the Civil Rights Act and the Affordable Care Act. Finally, there are the major court decisions, particularly by the Supreme Courts, such as the recent ruling upholding gay marriages.
- 6. State and Local Governments: Know and Monitor Your Local and State Elected Officials. Next, we will look at how our government is organized at state and local levels as well as at the federal level. The Constitution provides for a federal system of government that grants significant powers to the states and local government which provide most of the services that directly benefit the members (citizen and noncitizen alike) of our society.
- **7. Our Rights and Responsibilities:** Lift Our Voices to Form a More Perfect Union. Finally, in a democracy, in a country founded on the rule of the people, all these founding documents and amendments, laws, and court cases have to put practiced by the citizens of our country. We have both rights, like freedom of speech, and responsibilities, like voting for our elected officials. Ultimately, our most important right is also our most important responsibility, that is to lift our voices to create a more perfect union for citizens and non-citizens alike.

# 5. Major Amendments, Laws, and Court Decisions: Improve Our Constitution and Government







### 7. Our Rights and Responsibilities: Vote To Form a More Perfect Union





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I hereby declare, on oath, that I absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty of whomor which I have heretofore been a subject or citizen; that I will support and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I will bear arms on behalf of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform noncombatant service in the Armed Forces of the United States when required by the law; that I will perform work of national importance under civilian direction when required by the law; and that I take this obligation freely without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; so help me God.
